

IMPORTANT ANNOUNCEMENTS AND CHANGES IN 2009

EVENT REGISTRATION BEGINS - MONDAY, MARCH 16

Two-Day, Two-Man Events

- **NEW FOR 2009 – PRIORITY FOR ALL TWO-DAY, TWO-MAN “BEST BALL” EVENTS.** In a change from previous years, entries will be taken on a first come basis for the three Two-Day, Two-Man events **beginning, Monday, March 16.**
 - 1) Madden’s The Classic & Pine Beach East
 - 2) Alexandria G.C. & Geneva G.C.
 - 3) Pokegama G.C. & Eagle Ridge G.C.
- When a Two-Day, Two-Man event fills then a wait list will be created as entries come in. Those on any Two-Day, Two-Man event wait list will not receive a wait list designation as in the Individual Event registration process (See page 3).
- If you are looking for a partner for any of the Two-Day, Two-Man events, contact Karen who will have a list available of those players looking for partners. With the new priority with team events, be sure to contact Karen as quickly as possible to be added to the list. Karen will call or send an email to connect players, but it will be up to the players to talk and decide whether to team up and enter an event together.

Individual Events

- For all individual events - there is no priority for receipt of entry forms. To be considered for an individual event your entry must be received by each individual event entry deadline.
- If an individual event is oversubscribed a random drawing will be held to determine the wait list (See page 3).

Event Entry Deadlines

- Event entry deadlines are always by 4:30 pm on the Monday three weeks prior to each event. Event deadlines are shown on each Senior Tour Section home page at www.mngolf.org, on each event entry form and on each section’s event schedule mailed out to those without internet access.

Event Entry Checks

- **NEW FOR 2009 – ALL CHECKS FOR EACH EVENT ARE TO BE MADE OUT TO THE MGA.**
In a change from previous years, all checks for each event entry fee are to be **MADE OUT TO THE MGA** instead of host site. Individual checks are required for each event. Please do not send one check for multiple events, we’ll just send it back to you.

More Senior Tour Finals Qualifiers

- **CHANGE FOR 2009 –** We have added two more qualifier spots for Gross players in the Senior Tour Finals. The top four players in performance points, in the Net and Gross divisions for Seniors and Masters of each Section will qualify for 64 spots in the Senior Tour Finals. Senior Tour Roster

- **NEW FOR 2009 –** For the first time ever we will be creating a Senior Tour Roster to be available to all 2009 Senior Tour Members. The roster lists each 2009 member including: full name, member club, section, division and the contact information that each member wants displayed as specified on his application. Printed rosters will be available for pick up at all Senior Tour events. Please note after the season begins that we do get some contact changes. If you are having trouble reaching someone, check with Karen to see if there has been a change to the person’s contact information.

Event Cancellation Policy

- **CHANGE FOR 2009 –** For those players entered in an event who need to cancel, notification (*via email, phone or mail*) must be received in the MGA office no later than 3:00 p.m. on the Wednesday prior to an event to not incur the full event charge. Those players cancelling after 3:00 p.m. on the Wednesday prior to an event (no matter what day the event is scheduled - i.e. Monday, Tuesday or Wednesday) will still be charged the complete event fee. No shows will also be charged the complete event fee.

No Show Policy

We will be keeping track of all No Shows. Any player who has two or more No Shows will be automatically wait listed for any oversubscribed event they enter.

2009 MGA SENIOR TOUR HANDBOOK



TOUR FORMAT

The MGA Senior Tour is made up of four sections - Northern, Southern, Eastern and Western. Each section has a series of ten (10) 18-hole events and six (6) all sections better ball stableford events. A player may play in any section, but cannot play in more than one. One 18-hole round is played at each of the host facilities. Each 18-hole round is a separate competition. The form is various individual and better-ball team events in two age divisions, Senior Division (55-64) and Master Division (65 and over), with net and gross awards.

TOUR MEMBERSHIP ELIGIBILITY

The Senior Tour is open to amateur golfers who:

1. are current Associate Members of the Minnesota Golf Association and whose club is a member of the MGA. *Please contact your club in SPRING to ensure that your membership is active for the 2009 season.*
2. have reached their 55th birthday prior to their first scheduled participation.
3. have a Handicap Index limit of 24.4.

TOUR MEMBERSHIP APPLICATION PROCESS

Registration for the Senior Tour begins in early February each year. For the 2009 season registration begins MONDAY, FEBRUARY 2, 2009.

You may register two different ways:

1. Apply online with a credit card at www.mngolf.org
2. Fill out application and mail it or drop it off in our office with a check. Applications are available for download on our website at www.mngolf.org, also at the MGA office or will be mailed to players who request it. Applications are mailed to all of the previous year's participants who do not have an email address or online access.

Any applications RECEIVED PRIOR to Monday, February 2, 2009 will be returned to sender.

Each section of the MGA Senior Tour is limited to 215 members. Tour membership is limited to ensure that each tour member has the opportunity to compete in an average of 7 to 9 events. Please do not sign up for the MGA Senior Tour if you are only available to play in less than 4 events.

TOUR MEMBERSHIP ENTRY PROCEDURE

Applicants for the Senior Tour must complete an official Senior Tour membership application which must be signed and accompanied with the membership fee of \$55.00. Applications by telephone, fax or e-mail **will not** be accepted. MGA Senior Tour membership application forms will be accepted until the membership limit is reached. Senior Tour

membership must be made prior to the deadline for the first event the individual wishes to enter. Incomplete applications are not acceptable and will be returned. A check with insufficient funds will void the application, and it will be withdrawn. The applicant is responsible for any fees incurred by the MGA for checks returned for insufficient funds. The applicant must pay such fees before entry in any future MGA events is allowed.

SENIOR TOUR DIVISIONS (SENIOR/MASTER)

A player's division is determined by his age (Senior 55-64, Master 65+). A player's age for the year is *his age at the time of his first scheduled participation in an event for 2009.*

A player must reach his 55th birthday prior to his first scheduled participation for the Senior Division or 65th birthday prior to his first scheduled participation in the Master Division. You can't switch half way through the season.

For a Team event, if a Master player is paired with a Senior player you will compete in the Senior Division for that Team event. Any performance points made in a team event will be applied to each player's correct division in his section.

TOUR MEMBERSHIP WITHDRAWAL & REFUNDS

Senior Tour Membership Fee will be refunded if the MGA office is notified in writing and the following provisions are met:

1. Written notice of Tour membership resignation must be submitted before a player is accepted into his first Senior Tour Event or before the sixth event of the season.
- *A \$5.00 service charge will be deducted from all refunds.
If the above provisions are not met, no refund will be given for the Senior Tour Membership Fee.

ENTRY PROCEDURE FOR TOUR EVENTS

Registration for each event begins Monday, March 16, 2009.

Event entry forms will be available on our website by early March or distributed via mail to those without email or internet access.

INDIVIDUAL EVENT REGISTRATION - individual entry forms are not prioritized by mail or drop off date since all entry forms are considered for each event as long as they are received by the entry deadline.

Entries will be accepted with payment made to the MGA. A separate check is required for each event and will not be cashed until after the event has been held. Entries must be completed on an official entry form and must be accompanied with the entry fee. More than one entry may be included in one envelope or a multi-entry form made be used for multiple entries. Entries by telephone, fax or e-mail will not be accepted.

Entries close at 4:30 p.m. on the deadline date for each event. Time limit for entries means time of receipt at MGA, not postmark. Late or incomplete entries are not acceptable and will be returned. A check with insufficient funds will void the entry and will be withdrawn. The entrant is responsible for any fees incurred by the MGA for checks returned with insufficient funds. Entrants must pay such fees before entry in any future MGA event is allowed.

In the case of an oversubscribed field, there will be a blind draw after the closing entry date to bring the field down to 120 players (or the maximum number of players for the event) - those players not making it into the field will be put on a waiting list. Waiting list players will be contacted if openings become available. ***After the event, those still on the waiting list who did not play will receive a designation that prevents them from being wait listed again. This will help ensure that each member only has to sit out one oversubscribed event.***

TWO-DAY, TWO-MAN EVENT REGISTRATION - new in 2009 will be a priority process for all of the Two-Day, Two-Man Events. When a Two-Day, Two-Man event fills then a wait list will be created as entries come in. Waiting list players will be contacted if openings become available. Those on any Two-Day, Two-Man event wait list will not receive a wait list designation as in the Individual Event registration process.

All entrants who do not get in oversubscribed individual or team events will receive notice from the MGA after the closing date for entries with their entry status for the event.

ENTRY WITHDRAWAL AND REFUNDS FOR A PARTICULAR SENIOR TOUR EVENT

Entry fee will be refunded for a specific Senior Tour Event, regardless of reason, if the MGA office is notified before the close of entries for that particular event. After the close of entry date an entry may be cancelled in the event of injury, illness or unforeseeable schedule change. These cancellations can be made by 3:00 pm on the Wednesday before the date of play. No refunds will be given for any reason after the Wednesday prior to the start of the event has occurred.

SHOWING UP ON TIME & NO SHOWS

Please be respectful of the host site, Senior Tour staff and other competitors by showing up in a timely manner and honoring your commitment to participate. Arriving within 15 minutes of your shotgun time is considered late. Arriving late means you will not be guaranteed the ability to play due to the juggling of carts, tee boxes and foursomes prior to your arrival. No refund will be available in the event of withdrawal due to lateness. We will be keeping track of all late arrivals and No Shows. Any player who has two or more No Shows or late arrivals will be automatically wait listed for any oversubscribed event they enter.

PRACTICE ROUNDS

No provisions have been made for practice rounds at any Senior Tour sites, but clubs may be open to public play at prescribed times.

PAIRINGS AND STARTING TIMES

For half of the Senior Tour events, pairings are created in an ABCD format. We found this allowed more players the opportunity to play with different golfers throughout the summer. For the other half of the events, pairings will be created in handicap index order.

Each Senior Tour event will start at the time noted on the entry form for each MGA Senior Tour Event. If an event is extremely undersubscribed, modification may be made by the MGA Senior Tour Committee and will be explained in the notice to competitors sent to each player prior to the event. Once entries are accepted, only substitutions by entered players may be made. Any changes or substitutions after the close of the entries will be handled by the MGA.

PACE OF PLAY

Each participant is expected to complete their round and return their completed scorecard within 4 hours and 45 minutes of starting the round otherwise the scorecard will not be accepted for that event meaning no performance points or prizes awarded - ESC score will still be posted to GHIN.

CARTS

Contestants may carry their own bags except in events which specify carts are part of the entry fee. Pull carts are also acceptable. Contestants must indicate in the appropriate area on the entry forms their desire to use motorized carts for each Senior Tour event they are entering. Cart fees will be collected prior to each round by the host facility. Contestants must reserve a cart at time of entry. Contestants may be responsible for cost incurred if they cancel their cart reservation after the close of entries for a particular event. Nonpayment of these costs may affect their tour status and entry into future MGA events. Contestants must use the host club's carts.

FOOTWEAR POLICY

ALL Senior Tour Events require soft spikes.

MGA DRESS CODE

For all MGA competitions, players must be neat in appearance with respect to personal grooming and clothing. All males are required to wear shirts with collars or mock turtlenecks and sleeves, and either golf slacks or Bermuda shorts which measure no higher than two (2) inches above their knees. All females are required to wear either slacks,

shorts, or golf skirts that are of appropriate length, and golf tops (sleeveless tops are permitted).

Examples of attire NOT ACCEPTABLE include the following:

Short shorts, athletic shorts, tennis shorts, cutoffs, jeans, jean shorts, tank tops, t-shirts, and sweats pants. The committee in charge shall decide whether this requirement has been met and will withdraw the entry of any player who does not comply with this policy.

MGA CONDUCT POLICY

By submitting an entry, or by participating in any MGA competition, the player understands that his/her participation is at the sole discretion of the MGA. The player's entry may be rejected for any event, at the discretion of the Official in Charge, at any time before the close of the competition (as defined in the USGA Rules of Golf Book-Rule 34-1b). Likewise, the player's entry may be rejected, at the discretion of the Committee for reasons deemed necessary, at any time after the close of the competition. Unbecoming conduct or actions at any MGA event, or state, national, or international event, or conduct or action deemed detrimental to the MGA, the spirit of the game, or to the host facilities are grounds for such rejection.

These include, but are not limited to:

1. Cheating
2. Willful destruction of golf course or MGA property
3. Abusive language or conduct towards MGA and/or host facility, staff, volunteers, or other players
4. Abusive or derogatory criticism of the MGA and/or host facility staff, volunteers, or other players
5. Club throwing and/or physical endangerment of others
6. Offensive or excessively loud behavior
7. Alcohol and/or substance impaired behavior
8. Repeated withdrawals or no cards during or after completion of a round
9. Inappropriate golf attire
10. Other conduct deemed to be unbecoming

Should such an incident occur, the Official in Charge shall submit a report to the Senior Tour Committee. Future sanctions may range from suspension from future MGA events to not being eligible for MGA team competitions and/or player awards. This may include losing exempt status for future year(s). The decision to reject an entry during an event by the Official in Charge is final.

AWARDS

The formats are various individual events in two age divisions, Senior Division (55-64) and Master Division (65 & over), with net and gross awards. Merchandise certificates will be awarded as determined by the MGA Senior Tour Committee.

No contestant can win more than one award per event.

SENIOR TOUR SCORING REQUIREMENTS

In order to tabulate the winners of shotgun Tour events as quickly as possible, each score card must be filled out completely including gross and net scores. During stableford competitions, stableford points on each hole as well as total stableford points must be filled out on each score card. If a player fails to complete a hole, he must enter the score he most likely would have had. All scores shot during the MGA Senior Tour are tournament scores and will be posted by the MGA into each player's handicap record. Each score card must be totalled and have two signatures before it is turned into the scoreboard. Score cards that are not totaled or incomplete in any way will be returned to the players to complete before they will be accepted.

Be sure to start your score card on the hole on which you are starting and mark the card after each hole. Please keep a neat, legible score card. No individual or team may keep their own score.

Stableford Points

- 1 Point - Net Bogey
- 2 Points - Net Par
- 3 Points - Net Birdie
- 4 Points - Net Eagle
- 5 Points - Net Double Eagle

Upon completion of play, players must check their hole-by-hole scores carefully. Both the player and the marker must sign the card and return it to the Senior Tour site captain in a prompt manner.

MISCELLANEOUS

- The USGA Rules of Amateur Status will be the standard for the MGA Senior Tour. Each participant must conform to those Rules in every respect.
- Each participant in the MGA Senior Tour acknowledges that neither the Minnesota Golf Association nor the host facilities are responsible for any injury during the playing of any Senior Tour event.
- Each participant in the MGA Senior Tour acknowledges that his membership is subject to rejection at any time by the MGA. The reason for rejection may include unbecoming conduct (see MGA Conduct Policy to the left).
- The MGA reserves the right to use any photographic or video image of any competitor taken during a Senior Tour event for its own media-related use(s).

MGA SENIOR TOUR CAPS

Each registered Senior Tour participant is eligible to receive an official 2009 MGA Senior Tour Cap. Caps are available for pick up at events and in the MGA office.

SENIOR TOUR PERFORMANCE POINTS

The top eight (8) in the net and gross competition in each division in each event will receive Senior Tour Performance Points. Each player's performance points accumulate for a performance point total that is taken from their top four finishes. Performance points will be awarded as follows:

The top 8 in the net and gross competition

MGA SENIOR TOUR FINALS

After the last event in each section, the four (4) individuals with the most performance points in the net competition and gross competition in each age division in the Northern, Southern, Eastern and Western sections will be invited to the Senior Tour Finals. A total of 64 players will be in the finals. The Senior Tour Finals will be an individual stableford net and gross competition.

*The MGA Senior Tour Finals will be played
Thursday, September 24, 2009, at Wayzata Country Club.*

SENIOR TOUR - MGA RULES OF PLAY AND INFORMATION

PRINCIPAL CHANGES IN THE RULES OF GOLF MADE IN 2008 THAT YOU MUST KNOW!

RULE 15-3 Because the rule has been changed and it is now a two stroke penalty to hit a wrong ball in a hazard, you may now, if necessary, lift the ball for identification and place back on the same spot in the same lie. You may clean the ball only as much as necessary for identification.

RULE 19-2 If a ball struck by a player is accidentally deflected or stopped by the player, caddie or equipment, the penalty is now 1 stroke, both in stroke and match play. Previously it was 2 strokes in stroke play and loss of hole in match play.

RULE 24-1 Now allows a player to pick up a flagstick if a moving ball may strike it. Previously you were penalized 2 strokes in Stroke Play for being a nice guy. As in the past, equipment of any player may also be moved without penalty.

RULES 24-3b, 25-1c, 26-1 The term "reasonable evidence" has been replaced by "known or virtually certain" with respect to determining whether a ball that has not been found may be treated as lost in an obstruction or an abnormal ground condition or in a water hazard. The strong wording almost requires the players or people to see the ball enter the above conditions.

Minnesota Golf Association Senior Tour Play is governed by the USGA Rules of Golf and by the following Local Rules and Definitions. **Additional Local Rules for each club will be distributed at each event.**

Unless otherwise noted, the penalty for breach of a Local Rule or Condition is: Stroke Play-Two Strokes.

TIME OF STARTING - In an Individual event, the player shall start at the time and hole laid down by the Committee. If the player arrives at the starting point, ready to play before his group has completed their first hole, the penalty for failure to start on time is two strokes at the first hole in stroke play. If the player arrives after the first hole is completed, he is Disqualified. He may continue to play but cannot turn in a score.

LIMITATION ON GOLF BALLS - The One Ball Rule is not in effect.

OUT OF BOUNDS - Defined by nearest inside points of stakes, flags, fence posts, masonry walls at ground level. When OB is defined by a white line on the ground, the line itself is out of bounds. Rule 27-1.

WATER AND LATERAL WATER HAZARDS - Water hazards are defined by yellow stakes, flags or yellow lines. Lateral water hazards are defined by red stakes, flags or red lines. Rule 26-1.

- When stakes, flags and lines are used to define water and lateral water hazards, stakes and flags identify hazards and lines define margins.
- When a lateral water hazard is defined on only one side, it is deemed to extend to infinity.
- When water hazards and lateral water hazards are bounded by out of bounds, the hazard margin extends to and coincides with the out of bounds line.

GROUND UNDER REPAIR - Defined by white lines. French drains are deemed to be ground under repair. Flower beds on the course are also deemed to be ground under repair. Rule 25-1.

DISCONTINUANCE OF PLAY - When play is suspended for a potentially dangerous situation, play must discontinue immediately and shall not resume until the Committee has ordered a resumption of play. All practice areas shall be closed during suspension for a potentially dangerous situation until the Committee has declared them open. Penalty for breach of suspended play rule is disqualification.

Discontinuance of Play Signals:

- Potentially Dangerous situation - One prolonged airhorn note.
- Other types of suspension - Three consecutive airhorn notes, repeated.
- Resumption of play - Two short airhorn notes, repeated.

YARDAGE DISTANCE RANGE FINDERS are permissible. You may tell others the yardage or let them use the equipment. You may not talk about club selection. Information about distance is not advice.

The Local Rule for stones in bunkers is NOT in effect!!!

OBSTRUCTIONS - An obstruction is anything artificial, including the artificial surfaces of roads & paths and white lined areas tying into them, except:

- A. Objects defining out of bounds, such as a wall, fences, stakes & railings;
- B. Any part of an immovable artificial object which is out of bounds;
- C. Any construction declared by the Committee to be an integral part of the course. See Rule 24.

NO PRACTICE PUTTING RULE - Between the play of two holes, a player shall not play any practice stroke on or near the putting green of the hole last played. This does not preclude a player from finishing out a hole in a stableford event where his score may not be used in a team competition. Penalty - Two Strokes at next hole.

DOUBT AS TO PROCEDURE - Applies to stroke play. A competitor may play a second ball if the competitor is doubtful of his rights or procedure. Before taking further action, the competitor must announce to his marker or fellow-competitor his decision to proceed under this rule and which ball he wishes to count if the rules permit. The player shall report the facts to the Committee before returning his score card even if he scores the same with both balls; if he fails to do so, he shall be Disqualified.

OVERHEAD POWER LINES - If a ball strikes an overhead power line or cable, the player must disregard that stroke, abandon the ball and play another ball as nearly as possible at the spot from which the original ball was played in accordance with Rule 20-5.

EMBEDDED BALL - Anywhere "through the green," a ball embedded in its own pitch-mark in the ground, except in loose sand, may be lifted without penalty, cleaned and dropped as near as possible to the spot where it lay but not nearer the hole. Appendix I - Local Rules.

REPORTING RESULTS - *Upon completion of play, players should check their hole-by-hole scores carefully. Both the player and the marker must sign the card and return it to the Committee in a prompt manner.* All scores must be totalled.
